We had two representatives from North Central Accreditation inspecting our school for two days.

Dr. H. E. Mueller, from the University of Missouri and Dr. J. Fred Murphy, High School Principal from Indianapolis, Indiana. Accompanying the visitors were: Dr. Joseph A. Mason, Command Superintendent of all USAFE schools and Miss Helen Johannis, Superintendent of Area IV, which includes France. Our school was highly rated by the NCA representatives—a fact for which we can all be extremely proud, inasmuch as we were instrumental in making this visit a success.

HONOR ROLL

We at Dreux High School have just finished undergoing quite an ordeal—the first six weeks grading period.

Now that it's over, we can breathe again, that is at least for about four more weeks.

This grading period meant a great deal to all students as well as the faculty. We now have a better understanding of just exactly what to expect of our teachers and in turn, what they expect of us.

The next step after the grades were issued was to decide on certain standards for the honor roll. The final decision was made by Miss Barany, Mr. Roundtree and Mr. Francis.

The honor roll is divided up into three different percentiles: 4.0, 3.5 and 3.0. All subjects are counted and each letter

SENIORS HAVE HIGHEST GRADES

SCHOLARSHIPS

Senior students at Dreux American High School are eligible to compete for the 100 four-year scholarships offered by General Motors under its National Scholarship Plan, according to Mr. J.T. Lyon Principal.

The competition is open to young men and women who are high school seniors and United States citizens. Interested students must make application for both the GM National Scholarship and the Scholastic Aptitude Test of College Boards.

At least one GM award is made in each state, the

HONOR SQUAD

As the problem of cutting in the lunch line becomes more aggravated, the Student Council formed an Honor Squad to remedy the situation. This group consists of seventeen juniors and seniors, chosen because of their leadership and service (and size!), and is headed by Gunter Sharp and Bob Cole, president and vice-president, respectively. The duties of the Honor Squad are to keep order in the mess hall and the school during time and to aid in fire drills. Report cards came out recently with everybody eager to see the Honor Roll. The seniors had a higher percentage on the coveted list than any other class, and this posed some questions: Is there only a number of bright students in that class or do the seniors as a whole receive better grades? Does any trend of this type follow in the other classes?

For the answers we turned to Gunter Sharp and his calculating mind. The results were slightly more than expected. In all classes seniors acquired a grade point average of 2.84. Following them were the sophomores 2.58; juniors 2.48; and freshmen 2.37. The figures show graphically that the senior class is well above the others, and also that the juniors made a disappointing showing. The solid subjects, English, math, social studies, science, and French were aptly led by the first class; they only trailed in music and home economics, due to small numbers of students taking those courses.

What do these figures mean? It takes time to become accustomed to the stiffer pace; college ahead is an added incentive factor for the seniors.

The following is a table showing the class averages in the various departments with an A counting 4 1/2 points; B, 3; C, 2; (continued page 7)

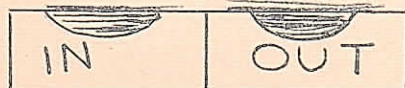

KIT'S KORNER WITH A "PENNY FOR YOUR THOUGHTS."

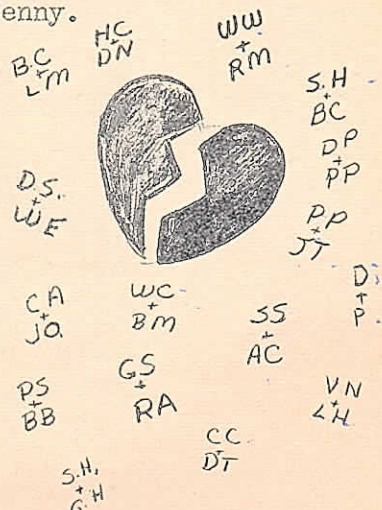

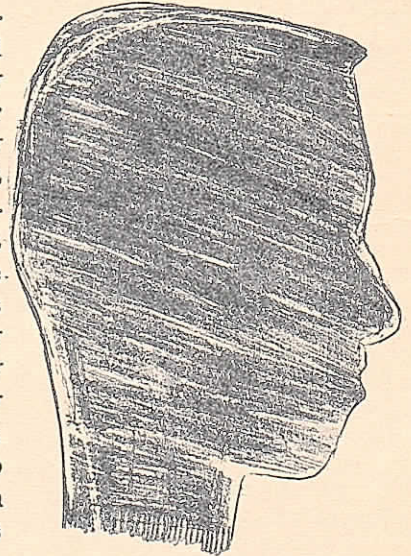
College Boards

COLLEGE BOARDS:

Juniors, this is the year for you to choose the college you wish to attend. The object of the college boards Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) is to help you in making this choice. The SAT gives you a chance to gain information about your intellectual abilities, and it will serve as a guide in choosing your college.

The SAT measures your basic skills and abilities. It is a test of your verbal (English usage) and mathematical proficiencies acquired over many years—both in and out of school. It is a test of reasoning agility, not a test of remembered facts.

The verbal and mathematical abilities are highly related to your academic success. Your scores on the SAT usually have a close relationship to the kind of success you have had with your studies. If you have done well in your studies,

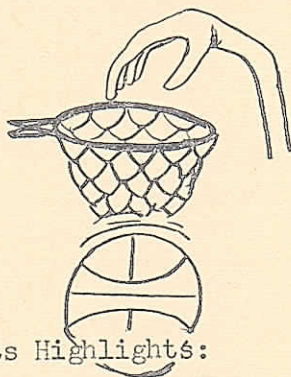

A Visit to the Classes
