### Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test

On October 18, 26 Seniors and 23 Juniors here at Drexel High School took the P.S.A.T. or Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test. This test is given annually, in October, under the direction of the College Entrance Examination Board.

Students wishing to take this test were required to register with Mr. Roundtree and pay a fee of 50 cents.

Seniors who wish to qualify for certain Scholarship awards may take this program, thirty sponsors offer 1600 scholarships.

Juniors could take the two-hour test as a "practice test" for the College Entrance Examination Board Scholastic Aptitude Test. The latter test is required for admission to most independent colleges and many state universities.

57% and 70% of their votes, respectively, for the GOP. The Republican candidate also holds slight edges with the Juniors and Freshman.

Nixon was also chosen as the most qualified Republican for the presidency with 80% followed by Rockefeller with 13% and Lodge with 7%.

The most qualified Democrats were chosen as follows: Kennedy 77%, Johnson 13%, Stevenson 7%, and Symington 3%.

President Eisenhower still retains his following, or so it seems. Students chose the person they would like to see in the presidential position, regardless of eligibility. Ike and Nixon took all the thunder from the Democrats in this one: Nixon 26%, Ike 18%, Kennedy 17%, Stevenson 11%, Rockefeller 9%. Others were Johnson, Lodge, President Truman, and Curtis Le May.

The Republicans were chosen to have, with a small margin, control of Congress.

Do the students follow the voting trends of their parents? There's room for discussion here. California was chosen; New York was for Nixon. The GOP candidate swept the industrial East and New England, 17 to 8, went Republican. The solid south stood firm with Kennedy taking 32 out of 55 votes. There were, however, big cracks at the edges in Tennessee and Florida.

Were the students serious about the pool? In general, yes. There were votes for Elvis Presley and Superman, but these came from the lower classes. A quite unexpected Mr. Mahanna-for-President movement came from the Senior girls, but this must be due to the outstanding popularity of our favorite science and trig teacher.
