TODAY IS THE DAY



One of the high-lights of Susie!s summer was a trip to a leper colony. My first thought of that was how gruesome it must have been. "It wasn't bad at all," she added, perhaps noticing the expression on my face. "Leprosy is actually an impairment caused by the deadening of nerve endings. Many of the sores on a leper's body are burns from the fire and other such injuries which

and other such injuries whigh he recièved unknowingly because a he couldn't feel pain."

Leprosy, or Hansen's disease, named after a Norwigian physician who discovered the germ in 1874, may also attack the lining of the nose, throat. and larynx. Besides the lack of feeling that injury to the nerves cause, a weakening and wasting of the muscles gradually develops. Leprosy may cripple a person severely, but it seldom causes death. may shorten life by weakening one's resistance, and so leading to tuberculosis, of other disease. Facial nerve damage often makes it impossible to close the eyelids tightly. This, of course, leaves the eyes_more susceptible .to pos÷ sible injury.

The leper colony that Susie described was clean, organized, and fairly well-equipped. She straightened out my old-fashioned ideas of leprosy with an account of its new serums and "The doctors have therapies. the disease almost completely under control," she said. "The colony started out with 3,000 is now down to cases and around 200. They have also started working on malaria, tuberculosis, and several other diseases."

Susie said that villages have been constructed for the lepers. They also have their own mills and are offered educations. She was very much impressed

with her visit. And I was very much impressed with our

talk.

S. Citizens who will reach the age of eighteen during the current school year.

The Universal Military Training and Service act requires that all male U.S. Citizens shall regist.

Any person who knowingly fails to register may render himself liable to prosecution and is subject to penalties of fine and imprisonment and ineligibility of continued passport service.


